

LAWASIA STATEMENT OF CONCERN AT TREATMENT OF LAWYERS IN CHINA

LAWASIA, the Law Association for Asia and the Pacific, notes its considerable disquiet at media and other reports of a significant number of recent arrests and interrogations of lawyers in the People's Republic of China.

Wide spread news reports indicate that police have arrested and detained a number of lawyers known for their involvement in "rights" cases.

As a body that represents the legal profession of the Asia Pacific region, LAWASIA will always have concern at such reports, especially noting Article 1 of the *United Nations Basic Principles on the Role of Lawyers*, which provides that:

1. All persons are entitled to call upon the assistance of a lawyer of their choice to protect and establish their rights and to defend them in all stages of criminal proceedings.

and to Article 16 which provides that:

16. Governments shall ensure that lawyers (a) are able to perform all of their professional functions without intimidation, hindrance, harassment or improper interference; (b) are able to travel and to consult with their clients freely both within their own country and abroad; and (c) shall not suffer, or be threatened with, prosecution or administrative, economic or other sanctions for any action taken in accordance with recognized professional duties, standards and ethics.

LAWASIA, noting that the independent functioning of the legal profession is a crucial factor in maintaining the rule of law, calls upon the government of the Peoples' Republic of China to observe and give effect to these *Principles* and to refrain from any and all action that would be or may be construed to be in violation thereof.

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
