LAWASIA STATEMENT OF CONCERN REGARDING THE PEOPLE'S REPUBLIC OF CHINA'S SANCTIONS AGAINST LAWYERS

- LAWASIA expresses its concerns about the sanctions announced by the People's Republic of China (PRC) against barrister members of the legal profession and their immediate family members. LAWASIA notes that other Bar Associations have commented on these actions.¹
- 2. LAWASIA is a regional association of lawyers, judges, jurists and legal organisations, which advocates for the interests and concerns of the legal profession in Asia and the Pacific. LAWASIA's objectives and activities include promoting the rule of law and respect for human rights and providing a voice for the legal community in Asia and the Pacific region.
- 3. LAWASIA understands that on 26 March 2021, the PRC imposed sanctions on nine individuals and four organisations, including the Essex Court Chambers.² This was in response to a legal opinion produced by four Essex Court barristers (Alison Macdonald QC, Jackie McArthur, Naomi Hart and Lorraine Aboagye) for The Global Legal Action Network, as lay clients. The opinion addressed legal issues arising from alleged human rights violations by PRC authorities against the Uyghur population in the Xinjiang region of the PRC.³ Sanctions were imposed on Helena Kennedy QC and Sir Geoffrey Nice QC; as well as on the Essex Court Chambers as a whole.
- 4. LAWASIA understands that the implications of the sanctions are that the lawyers and their immediate family members are prohibited from entering mainland China, Hong Kong and Macau, that their property in China will be frozen, and Chinese citizens and institutions will be prohibited from doing business with them. LAWASIA also understands that the sanctions have had serious professional implications, including: barristers from Essex Court Chambers' affiliate in Singapore,

Essex Court Duxton, being forced to leave and establish a new practice;⁴ barristers leaving Essex Court Chambers to move to other Chambers;⁵ and uncertainty for barristers working in Hong Kong) and Macau .⁶

- 5. LAWASIA notes that Principle 18 of the United Nations Basic Principles on the Role of Lawyers states that "lawyers shall not be identified with their clients or their clients' causes as a result of discharging their functions".⁷ LAWASIA also notes that Principle 16 of the Basic Principles requires states to refrain from "improper interference" in the professional functions of lawyers.⁸ Principle 16 also states that lawyers "shall not suffer, or be threatened with, prosecution or administrative, economic or other sanctions for any action taken in accordance with recognized professional duties, standards and ethics".
- 6. LAWASIA is concerned that these measures, imposed on lawyers for providing a legal opinion, contravene these two provisions. Additionally, sanctioning the barristers' chambers as a whole indiscriminately targets all legal professionals within those chambers. The chambers comprise other barristers practising from the same premises, as independent legal practitioners, and sanctioning them goes against the fundamental basis of the rule of law which requires access to competent and independent legal advice. LAWASIA considers that sanctions targeting lawyers for complying with their professional obligations are a threat to the regional legal community.
- 7. LAWASIA calls on the PRC to withdraw these sanctions, in furtherance of its commitment to upholding the rule of law and Principle 16 and 18 of the United Nations Basic Principles on the Role of Lawyers.
