Greetings from LAWASIA.

It is my pleasure to welcome you to LAWASIA's Data Protection Workshop in Tokyo. The theme of the workshop 'Data Protection Laws on the Move

in the Asia-Pacific Region' is of particular significance. The words 'on the move' allude to the elusive nature of data, which often leads to its casual treatment. Today, even reading the news online requires you to trade your data either by subscribing or by creating a so-called 'free' account. This 'free' access is a misnomer; the real cost is the information you hand over. The moment you click the button, your data begins globetrotting.

In the digital world, it is imperative that data protection comports with fair treatment within the framework of economic Rule of Law. Foundational Rules of Law principles underpin good economic governance: certainty, predictability, fair rules made in a fair manner, and transparency. This last value, transparency, is of particular relevance if we are to protect liberty in its modern avatar, privacy. In the current digital landscape, the informational asymmetry is so extreme that Big Tech knows everything about us and the citizen knows next to nothing about the technology companies. While good legal governance attracts investment, regulates competition for fair markets and enables growth, it is extremely difficult to design appropriate institutions and regulatory frameworks where the functioning of technology companies and platforms are near opaque. The unregulated universe of artificial intelligence exacerbates the challenge.

Since we are constantly tracked at every turn, perhaps there is a need to gain control over our own digital ledgers enabling us to see how our data is used and to track where it travels. Stronger regulations are essential to build public trust.

I am sure your deliberations at the workshop will strengthen our understanding of digital governance and proffer principles to protect privacy rights in their widest amplitude.

I thank the Japan Federation of Bar Associations and Chuo University, Institute of Comparative Law in Japan for their steadfast support throughout the planning and execution of the event. My heartfelt thanks to Dr. Sunil Abeyaratne, Chair, and Prof. Hiroshi Miyashita, Vice Chair of the LAWASIA Communications, Technology and Data Protection Committee for conceiving and delivering this important LAWASIA workshop.


